Oates Appointed State Forester, Green Is ATFA Executive Director

ormer Alabama TREASURE Forest Association (ATFA) Resource Coordinator William Green has been named the organization's executive director, as ATFA's Rick Oates began duties as state forester April 10.

In his new role, Oates oversees the Alabama Forestry Commission's (AFC) 240 employees whose mission is to protect and sustain Alabama's forest resources. Oates replaced interim State Forester Gary M. Cole.

"Our state is blessed with more than 23 million acres of timberland, and about 87 percent belongs to private landowners," said Oates, 49. "Alabama forests are an economic engine providing hundreds of thousands of jobs in our state. They provide endless recreational opportunities for hunters and outdoorsmen and are a renewable natural resource."

In addition to his duties as ATFA executive director, Green is the Alabama Farmers Federation's Forestry and Wildlife Divisions director.

Oates formerly held both titles. Previously, he was chief of staff for Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries Commissioner John McMillan and held several positions with the Alabama Forestry Association.

A native of Corpus Christi, Texas, Oates has a bachelor's degree in natural resources from The University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee, in addition to a master's degree in forestry from Auburn University. Oates and wife Kelly live in Montgomery and have two children, Andrew and Lauren.

Green is a Pintlala native and a 2014 Auburn University graduate in wildlife sciences. He interned with the Federation for several months before becoming a commodity director in April 2016. William and his wife, Mallory, live in Montgomery, where she is a fifth-grade teacher at St. James School.

"I'm excited about the opportunity to continue working with the Alabama TREASURE Forest Association as well as the Federation's Forestry and Wildlife Divisions," Green said. "I've enjoyed my time with them so far, and I'm

ATFA Vanity Plates Ready For Pick Up

Thanks to everyone who pre-committed to the newly redesigned "I'd Rather Be in the Woods" license plate. The tags were available starting June 1.

VOUCHERS

If you provided a valid email address with your application, you should have received a pre-commitment redemption voucher from the state of Alabama April 19. If you did not provide a valid email address, your should receive a voucher in the mail soon.

NEXT STEP

To receive your tag, present your voucher at your county's licensing office. Remember, your free tag is only valid for 2017. If your normal tag renewal month is June or after, redeem your voucher when you would normally renew your tag. If your renewal month has already passed, you may redeem the voucher at any time for a small fee. To personalize your license plate, visit https://pros.mvtrip.alabama.gov to reserve your message.

NEED A TAG?

If you were unable to pre-commit to the tag, have gotten a new vehicle or would like an additional plate, you may purchase one for \$50 whenever you renew your tags. Thanks for your support, and we hope you enjoy showing everyone where you'd rather be!





Legislation Aids State Forest Agency And Timber Industry

egislation simplifying the timber severance tax to prevent double taxation of materials from a single log received the governor's signature this session. The bill also allows the tax to be calculated based on tonnage rather than board feet. Rep. Elaine Beech, D-Chatom, sponsored the legislation.


The Alabama Forestry Commission (AFC) received \$7.5 million from the Ed-

ucation Trust Fund and General Fund budgets. The appropriation included an additional \$99,100 for rural and community fire protection.

The Legislature also approved a \$550,000 supplemental appropriation to the AFC from the Emergency Forest Fire Fund. Rep. Kyle South, R-Fayette, and Sen. Trip Pittman, R-Montrose, sponsored the bill, which aims to



offset wildfire-related costs from 2016. The agency incurred more than \$1.5 million additional expenses in man-hours and equipment costs last year. Gov. Kay Ivey also released nearly \$500,000 from her discretionary departmental emergency fund to help the AFC.



Henry, Pike County Students Learn In The Great Outdoors

County TREASURE Forest chapters held multiple Classroom in the Forest (CITF) events throughout the 2016-2017 school year. CITF educates fifth-graders and their teachers about multiple-use forest resource management, the importance of private landowners and the valuable resources found in Alabama forests.



Two hundred fifty fifth-graders from Henry County Schools and Abbeville Christian Academy attended Classroom in the Forest May 12 on Glenn and Scarlett Riley's TREASURE Forest. Students learned about pond management, wildlife, tree health and forest ecology.
